This is why I remind you to fan into flames the spiritual gift God gave you...

2 Timothy 1:6

My sons watched their uncle walk back and forth from the bricked fire pit to the wooded yard beyond it, gathering branches to put in the hollowed quarry.

"What next, Uncle Anthony?"
