

COMMIT

Thus says the Lord, the King of Israel and his Redeemer, the Lord of hosts: "I am the first and I am the last, and there is no God besides Me." - Isaiah 44:6

CONSIDER

As Believers in Christ, we are overcomers, but we need to adopt the right perspective on Satan's attempts to harm and test us. Satan may be telling us that he plans to steal from us, kill us and destroy us (John 10:10)—but when he does, remember that God is greater than our enemy. The beautiful thing about being a Believer in Christ is that God is crafty enough to allow Satan to believe he is throwing you to your demise, but he is actually throwing you straight into God's hands—even in the midst of your suffering.

Believers in Christ will also need to adopt the right perspective on what it means to embrace the life of an overcomer. Namely, an overcomer is someone who takes their position in Christ and makes it their practice in Christ. It is not someone who is trying to overcome. It is someone who recognizes that they have already overcome—they are only in a process of working the overcoming out in their day-to-day life.

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The church at Smyrna, which is the focus of our time this week, was located some thirty five miles from the previous church we looked at in Ephesus. Smyrna was a well-known city that had buildings constructed and erected in the shape of a crown. This is because it was one of the cities in Asia that had focused on emperor worship. Smyrna was a place where the Christians were undergoing a great deal of tribulation and trials. This is because the believers living in Smyrna were disciples. They were not secretive about their faith. Will you remain faithful?





CONNECT

Remember to always open your group time together in prayer. Invite God's Spirit to manifest Himself fully in your midst, to soften your hearts and open your ears to His Word as well as to guard your lips—seasoning each person's speech as with salt. Keep specific prayer requests to be covered at the end of the meeting, if possible. This is a time to connect with each other and to connect with God as we open our time together.

3.	Based on the video teaching, Pastor Evans says that a test has a purpose for it. It does two things. What two things do spiritual tests do and does knowing this truth bring you comfort in any way?

CONFERGE "be doers of the Word, not just hearers" - James 1:22

In this section, talk with the group about how you will apply the wisdom you've learned from the teaching and Bible study.

Discuss the following questions:

- 1. Describe a time in your life where you felt that the Lord was allowing testing and trials for some reason only He knew. What gave you the strength to continue in faith during this time?
- 2. What are some things we can do to encourage others who may be going through a season of testing? What are some things we probably shouldn't do or say during those times?
- 3. Have someone read James 1:2-4. Based on this Scripture passage, what do trials produce in us? Have you seen a progression in your maturity to steadfastly handle trials and tests that would have been too much for you in the past? How does that make you feel to witness your own personal growth toward wholeness?

Focusing on practical applications of what we've learned in this lesson in order to better align our life choices with God's truth and will.

To close your time together, spend some time worshiping God together—praying, singing, reading Scripture. Use the Prayer and Praise to keep track of how God answers prayer.

Day 1

The steadfast of mind You will keep in perfect peace, because he trusts in You. Trust in the Lord forever, for in God the Lord, we have an everlasting Rock. - Isaiah 26:3-4

REFLECT:

Since trials are designed to produce steadfastness in us, what are we guaranteed is a result of these trials based on this passage?

Are you required to keep yourself in perfect peace, or is it God who does this?

What is your part to play in living as an overcomer who experiences perfect peace?

Day 2

Peace I leave with you; My peace I give to you; not as the world gives do I give to you. Do not let your heart be troubled, nor let it be fearful. - John 14:27

REFLECT:

What two things are we not to allow our hearts to be?

How is Christ's peace different than the peace the world gives?

Peace is priceless. In what ways can you align your thoughts and mindsets under God at a greater level than you already are in order to tap into His gift of peace?

Day 3

For in the day of trouble He will conceal me in His tabernacle; in the secret place of His tent He will hide me; He will lift me up on a rock. And now my head will be lifted up above my enemies around me. and I will offer in His tent sacrifices with shouts of joy; I will sing, yes, I will sing praises to the Lord. - Read Psalm 27:5-6

REFLECT:

What three things does this passage say the Lord will do for you on the day of trouble?

What is to be your response when He does this for you?

Have you ever experienced a deeper intimacy with God during a trial than while things are going along well for you? How does having a mind-set that acknowledges this ahead of time help you to mentally prepare for a trial you may one day face?

Day 4

For we do not want you to be unaware, brethren, of our affliction which came to us in Asia, that we were burdened excessively, beyond our strength, so that we despaired even of life; indeed, we had the sentence of death within ourselves so that we would not trust in ourselves, but in God who raises the dead. - 2 Corinthians 1:8-9

REFLECT:

Does it surprise you that the great apostle Paul despaired of life, or in our contemporary language, was suicidal?

What was God teaching Paul and his companions during this severe time of testing?

Jesus introduced Himself to the church of Smyrna as the One who died but who was also raised from the dead. Paul refers to trusting in God who raises the dead as the lesson he learned from his tribulation. In what ways does the reality that nothing is final unless God says it is final give you strength to face the trials and tests you may be in or may one day be in?

Day 5

Thus says the LORD, the King of Israel and his Redeemer, the LORD of hosts: "I am the first and I am the last, and there is no God besides Me." - Isaiah 44:6

REFLECT:

What do you think it means when God refers to Himself as the first and the last?

How does the truth of God's preeminence over all affect the way you view your personal challenges?

Since there is no God besides God, what does He deserve from you?
